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第 79 届会务报告

马来西亚中华总商会（中总）第 79 届中央理事会谨此提呈第 79 届会务报告及 2025 年度全年财务账目报告如下：

1 马来西亚中华总商会（中总）简介

马来西亚中华总商会（中总）是国内华裔商会的联合总机构，其17个基本会员，分布在国内13个州及联邦直辖区。本会实际上是唯一在国内最早拥有完整区域代表性的工商业。

中总成立于1921年7月2日，是在马来西亚社团注册法令下注册的团体。中总基本会员直接和间接会员总数超过110,000（11万）名，代表马来西亚华人公司、商家及各行业团体。在我国自由结社的原则下，中总在言论和行动上有自主权，能充分扮演它代表工商界的角色。中总会员也包括杰出会员、团体会员以及近10,000名青商会员。

中总章程中列明的宗旨如下：

- (1) 促进马来西亚各地华人工商会、商团与/或工业团体及/或商业公司的联络与合作，共同维护及争取属会会员在商业、工业、原产业及其他经济活动方面的权益和发展；
- (2) 研讨及拟定大马华人工商界对国内社会经济发展问题的见解和建议，藉以促进与政府或其他机构或团体间的了解与合作，共同致力于发展国民经济和加强全民团结；
- (3) 汇集、整理及传播有关工商及其他经济活动的资料；
- (4) 联络其他商会或经济团体，主办或参加经济会议、工商考察团、工商展览会及其他有关促进经济合作的活动；
- (5) 提倡社会福利事业及主办或协办有利于国民经济发展的入力训练计划或研讨会；
- (6) 在有关各造同意下协助本会会员调解纠纷；

(7) 接收及/或接受捐、赠、拨款、津贴、在股票交易所上市的证券以及任何其他有价值之合法文件并以其作为投资及/ 或以其他方式处理之；以及

(8) 推行其他符合本会宗旨的活动。

中总的合作网络广泛，截至2026年5月31日，中总与国内外商会和经济团体签署了118 份谅解备忘录或合作协议。中总于2003年及2024年成功主办第七届及第十七届世界华商大会，加强与世界各地中华总商会之联系，目前是世界华商大会顾问委员会成员。

中总是马来西亚全国总商会成员，这个全国商会最高组织，其他成员包括马来西亚马来人总商会、马来西亚印度人总商会、马来西亚国际总商会以及马来西亚厂商联合会。中总永久名誉会长丹斯里戴良业及丹斯里卢成全上议员曾担任全国总商会总会长。

中总与政府各部门及机构保持密切联系，对影响经济领域的课题进行有效的磋商。政府许多的经济咨询委员会、对话会、研讨会等都邀请中总委派代表出席。中总与国内工商团体及主要华团，定期进行交流，就经济和华社课题交换意见。

中总于 2010 年成立中总社会经济研究中心，为中总智囊机构，进行经济课题的研究，以更有效地向政府提呈具体建议及策略，为国家经济发展作出更大的贡献。

中总的代表性、咨询及服务作用受到各界广泛承认。作为一个结合不同商业利益的组织（其成员来自批发及零售行业、贸易、工业及制造业、建筑及地产业、服务业、原产业及农业等领域），因此致力于求同存异，为工商界谋求共同之利益。

- 19.1 中总为应对企业转型升级及人才发展的需求，于 2025 年正式成立“中总培训中心（ACCCIM Academy）”，致力打造面向企业家、企业管理层及专业人士的商业教育与培训平台。培训中心的成立，标志着中总在企业培训、人才发展及终身学习领域迈出新的里程碑。

- 19.2 中总培训中心以推动企业人才发展、提升企业竞争力及促进产学合作为目标，积极与本地及国际高等院校、专业机构及行业伙伴建立合作关系。目前，培训中心已与拉曼大学企业及社区发展中心（UTAR CCCD）、拉曼理工大学（TAR UMT）、亚洲商学院（Asia School of Business）、政府—业界技职教育与培训协调组织（GITC）等机构展开合作交流，并与北京大学、清华大学、哈尔滨工业大学等高等学府进行接洽，逐步建立培训与学习合作网络。同时，培训中心亦已与 UTAR CCCD 检讨市场需求及课程参与情况，并就课程发展方向及运作模式进行调整；也曾与 TAR UMT 就培训课程合作及 Micro-Credentials（微认证）课程推广进行商讨。
- 19.3 为了协助企业善用政府培训资源，中总培训中心已符合 HRD Corp（人力资源发展机构）相关培训资格要求，可协助各工作组、属会及合作单位办理培训补贴申请。通过整合培训机构、专业讲师及产业资源，培训中心进一步发挥协调平台作用，协助企业降低培训成本，并推动更多企业参与人才培育及技能提升计划。
- 19.4 中总培训中心于 2026 年 6 月 13 日成功举办首场线下课程《马来西亚投资与生活实务精讲班》，吸引商协会及企业代表踊跃参与。课程邀请中总财政拿督孔令龙太平绅士及资深律师方维城担任主讲嘉宾，围绕马来西亚投资环境与政策、企业设立与营运实务、税务规划与合规管理，以及马来西亚生活与长期发展规划等课题进行分享。课程获得学员积极响应及良好评价，不仅提升中总培训中心的品牌知名度，也为培训中心后续课程发展奠定良好基础。

21 中总“2026年国家财政预算案”线上解析论坛暨新闻发布会

- 21.1 中总于 2026 年国家财政预算案公布当晚，联同亚洲电视新闻举办“中总 2026 年国家财政预算案”线上论坛暨新闻发布会，及时点评预算案所提出的各项政策与措施，并分析其对国家经济、工商界及中小型企业的影响。
- 21.2 线上论坛由著名财经主持人黄隽斌先生主持，点评嘉宾包括中总总财政拿督孔令龙太平绅士、中总商务组副主任黄諄瀚先生，以及中总社会经济研究中心执行董事李兴裕先生。
- 21.3 总会长拿督吴逸平在活动开场点评指出，2026 年国家财政预算案是一份兼具应变能力与发展导向的预算案，既关注减轻人民生活成本压力，也协助工商界应对全球经济挑战。预算案重点包括扩大技职教育与培训、推动半导体及

蓝绿经济等高价值投资、加速人工智能和科技应用、加强研发与创新，以及促进中小微型企业投资与区域发展。他也欢迎政府采纳中总在市场发展基金、绿色能源、农业投资、房地产及加速资本津贴等方面提出的部分建议。

22 马来西亚商业和经济状况调查

- 22.1 在本届期间，中总与中总社会经济研究中心继续联合开展马来西亚商业和经济状况调查（M-BECS），并发布两期调查报告，分别涵盖 2025 年上半年及下半年预测，以及 2025 年下半年及 2026 年上半年前景。M-BECS 持续反映企业第一线的实际经营情况，为中总掌握经济与商业趋势，以及向政府和相关机构反映工商界关注课题提供重要依据。
- 22.2 在 2025 年上半年及下半年预测调查中，共收到 777 份回复，并首次引入商业状况指数（BCI）及商业信心指数（BSI）。2025 年上半年的 BCI 为 86.5，下半年的 BSI 为 97.4，均低于中性水平 100，显示企业对经济与商业前景持谨慎偏悲观态度。企业主要面对高营运成本、原材料价格上涨、消费者行为改变、商业与消费者信心下降，以及现金流压力，同时受到美国关税政策不确定性、国内外需求放缓及扩大征收消费税等因素影响。调查也显示，企业期望政府在 2026 年财政预算案中加强中小企业融资与能力建设、提供税务减免与投资激励，以及推动更有利的税制改革。扩大征收消费税实施后，多数企业反映营运成本增加、利润率下降及行政负担加重，并关注相关规定不明确、应税项目分类困难及官方沟通不一致等问题。
- 22.3 在 2025 年下半年及 2026 年上半年前景调查中，共获得 817 家企业回复，绝大多数为中小企业。调查显示，2025 年下半年的商业环境虽然仍具挑战，但已逐步回稳，企业信心亦有所改善，对 2026 年上半年的经济与商业前景维持审慎但偏向正面的态度。高营运成本仍是企业面对的首要挑战，其次为原材料价格上涨、国内需求偏弱及市场竞争加剧。调查亦反映税务退款延误、外籍劳工招聘程序复杂、审批时间冗长，以及企业聘用技职教育与培训（TVET）

毕业生比例偏低等问题。中总因此持续呼吁政府提高政策清晰度、加快税务退款及人力审批程序，并通过数码化及人工智能提升行政效率与透明度，为企业营造更具竞争力的营商环境。

23 2025 年中总全国中学科技创新比赛

- 23.1** 中总全国中学科技创新比赛，自 2007 年举办至今已有 19 年。比赛宗旨是倡导青少年学生对科技创新的兴趣，及提升青少年学生对科技创新的认知和发挥创新能力。比赛开放予全国独中和国民中学生参加。参赛学生可提呈科学、工程或工艺创新产品的参赛作品。
- 23.2** 2025 年中总全国中学科技创新比赛颁奖仪式于 2025 年 12 月 5 日，在中总会议厅举办，由拿督吴逸平主持。
- 23.3** 评审团在首轮评审中严格遴选，最终选出 12 组参赛队伍晋级决赛。决赛阶段于 2025 年 10 月 11 日举行，并以线上与线下并行方式，向决赛圈评审们进行各自创作的简报陈述，最终评选出 7 支得奖队伍。决赛圈评审团由拿督李仕伟教授博士、黄伟杰博士、关万和博士及陈俊彦老师担任。

43.2 本届峰会共吸引逾 1,600 名与会者，来自 426 家机构，并获得 35 家赞助商与合作伙伴支持。现场设有 15 个展位，共有 40 位来自 8 个国家的重量级讲者参与分享，同时吸引 10 家媒体进行报道，全面提升活动影响力。

峰会战略合作伙伴为马来西亚大华银行，也获得 23 家赞助商支持，现场设有 4 个赞助展位，筹委会主席为总财政拿督孔令龙太平绅士。

- 48.2 中总于 2025 年 10 月 6 日在八打灵再也喜粤海鲜酒家特设欢迎晚宴款待逾 60 名东盟及其他海外代表团的莅临，并

邀请马来西亚房屋及地方政府部长 YB 倪可敏出席担任主宾。

- 48.3** 首届的东盟华商菁英峰会企业对接于 2025 年 10 月 7 日上午，假八打灵再也万达酒店隆重举办，为峰会第二天的系列活动拉开序幕。活动邀请马来西亚财政部副部长 YB 林慧英为主宾，旨在通过高效配对系统和广泛的企业网络，成功促进多领域企业建立长远合作关系，与各国商界携手共创更具包容性与可持续性的东盟经济新格局。

此次企业对接环节涵盖汽车、消费品、食品与农业、医疗与保健、信息科技及服务业六大领域，吸引 273 家海内外企业参与，共签署 51 份合作备忘录，创逾亿令吉（2100 万美元）跨国合作价值。现场成功缔结对接合作的企业分别来自东帝汶、寮国、越南、新加坡、中国、阿联酋、马来西亚、柬埔寨及缅甸。

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ACCCIM 79TH ANNUAL REPORT

The ACCCIM 79th National Council has the pleasure in submitting the Annual Report for the 79th Term and the Audited Annual Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2025 as follows:

1. ACCCIM IN BRIEF

The Associated Chinese Chambers of Commerce and Industry of Malaysia (ACCCIM) is the national level organisation of the Chinese chambers of commerce in the country. It has 17 Constituent Members located separately in the 13 states and Federal Territories of the nation. In fact, ACCCIM is the earliest national level chamber of commerce to have a complete regional representation in the country.

The ACCCIM was founded on 2nd July 1921 as a society under Malaya's Societies Act. Direct and indirect membership of all Constituent Members are well over 110,000, representing Malaysian Chinese companies, individuals and trade associations in particular and the Chinese business community in general. Membership of ACCCIM include Eminent Members, Associate Members and nearly 10,000 young entrepreneurs.

The ACCCIM's objectives as provided in the Constitution are as follows:

1. To promote liaison and cooperation among the various Chinese chambers of commerce and industry, trade and/or industrial associations and/or business corporations in Malaysia for the protection and advancement of the interests of their members in respect of commerce, industry, primary industries and other economic activities.
2. To study and formulate views, observations and recommendations of the Malaysian Chinese business community in respect of the nation's socio-economic development, so as to promote better understanding between the community and the Government and other public/private sector organisations, and in furtherance of this objective, to contribute towards the development of national economy and promotion of national unity.
3. To collect, collate and disseminate information relating to commerce, industry and other economic sectors.
4. To liaise with other chambers of commerce or economic organisations, to organise or participate in meetings relating to economic matters, trade missions, exhibitions and other activities relevant to the promotion of economic cooperation.
5. To promote social welfare activities as well as organise or sponsor manpower training programmes or seminars beneficial to the economic development of

the nation.

6. To arbitrate in the matter of disputes between members of ACCCIM (with the consent of both parties).
7. To receive and/or accept donations, gifts, grants, subsidies, securities listed in the stock exchange and any other instruments of value and to hold the same for investment and/or deal with the same; and
8. To perform any other services pertinent to the functions of ACCCIM.

The collaboration network of ACCCIM is very wide. ACCCIM has up to 31st May 2026, signed 118 Memorandums of Understanding or Economic Cooperation Agreements with overseas chambers of commerce and economic organisations. ACCCIM has enhanced relationship with Chinese Chambers of Commerce from all around the world after successfully organising the 7th and 17th World Chinese Entrepreneurs Convention (WCEC) in 2003 and 2024 respectively. ACCCIM is a member of the WCEC Advisory Committee.

ACCCIM is a member of National Chamber of Commerce and Industry of Malaysia (NCCIM), an apex organisation comprising five principal private sector bodies namely ACCCIM, Malay Chamber of Commerce Malaysia (DPMM), Malaysian Associated Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (MAICCI), Malaysian International Chamber of Commerce and Industry (MICCI) and Federation of Malaysian Manufacturers (FMM). ACCCIM Life Honorary President, Tan Sri Ter Leong Yap and YB Senator Tan Sri Low Kian Chuan have also served as President of NCCIM.

ACCCIM maintains close rapport with Government Ministries and Agencies as a channel for consultation over a wide range of issues, and participate in many consultative panels, dialogues, seminars etc. with the Government. ACCCIM regularly interact with chambers of commerce, trade organisations and major Chinese associations in Malaysia to discuss and exchange ideas on economic and trade issues, and issues affecting the Chinese community.

The ACCCIM has established a Socio-Economic Research Centre (SERC Sdn. Bhd.) in 2010 as a think-tank to carry out research on economic issues in order for ACCCIM to make concrete and strategic suggestions to the Government and effectively contribute to the development of the national economy of Malaysia.

The representative, consultative and service functions of the ACCCIM have been widely acknowledged. As the ACCCIM is an organisation that brings together diversified interests of the business community (including wholesale and retail, trade, industries and manufacturing, construction and property, services as well as agriculture and primary industries' sectors of the economy), it endeavours to reconcile divergent viewpoints and economic interests to the advantage of all.

18. ACCCIM PROPERTIES / ASSETS

18.1 Office Lots at 6th Floor, Menara KH

The ACCCIM convened an Extraordinary General Meeting on 30th September 2003, which approved the proposal to purchase an existing office premises at 6th Floor, Menara KH, Jalan Sultan Ismail, Kuala Lumpur with total area of 5,190.28 sq. ft.. The purchasing price was RM 928,000.00. This property is presently vacant.

18.2 Office Lot at 6th Floor, Wisma Chinese Chamber

The ACCCIM 3rd Extraordinary General Meeting for the 63rd Term held on 21st May 2010 passed a resolution for ACCCIM to purchase an office space at 6th Floor of Wisma Chinese Chamber, Jalan Ampang, Kuala Lumpur with floor area 15,522 sq. ft. and the purchasing price was RM 3,800,000.00. The ACCCIM Secretariat was relocated to Wisma Chinese Chamber on 23rd January 2011.

18.3 Shop Lots at Bandar Menjalara

The ACCCIM had deemed to acquire a 3-storey shop located at Bandar Sri Menjalara, Kuala Lumpur on the 1 November 2023. All the units were purchased with a total purchase price of RM4,300,000.00.

The ACCCIM had classified these units as an investment property and will continue rent them out to its existing tenant at a rental rate of RM17,600 per month.

18.4 Shop Lots at Sri Petaling

This is a 2-storey shop lots acquired in year 2025. Both the ground floor and the 1st floor have been rented out at the rental rate of RM7,500 p.m. and RM2,800.00 p.m. respectively.

18.5 Shop Lots at Bandar Sungai Long

This is a 3-storey shop lots acquired in year 2025. All the units within this property have been rented out.

18.6 Shares of IOI Corporation Berhad

The ACCCIM 1st Extraordinary General Meeting for the 67th Term held on 21st February 2014 passed a resolution for ACCCIM to purchase 1,500,000 units of IOI Corporation Berhad's shares at RM 4.60 per unit share, amounted to RM 6,900,000.00.

18.7 Shares of ELK-Desa Resources

The ACCCIM received a notification on 23rd March 2023 informing that share owners of ELK-Desa Resources Berhad, for every two (2) shares of ELK-Desa Resources Berhad hold as at 20th March 2023, will be allotted one (1) bonus share of ELK-Desa Resources Berhad. In view of ACCCIM owned 477,812 units of ELK-Desa Resources Berhad's shares at that point of time, ACCCIM was allotted 238,906 units of bonus shares of ELK-Desa Resources Berhad.

19. ACCCIM ACADEMY

- 19.1 ACCCIM officially established the ACCCIM Academy in 2025 as a business education and training platform for entrepreneurs, business leaders, management personnel and professionals. The establishment of the Academy marked an important milestone in ACCCIM's efforts to promote corporate training, talent development and lifelong learning.
- 19.2 The Academy actively collaborates with local and international educational institutions, professional bodies and industry partners to develop training programmes relevant to current business needs. These include collaborations and engagements with UTAR CCCD, TAR UMT, Asia School of Business

(ASB), GITC, as well as discussions with institutions such as Peking University, Tsinghua University and Harbin Institute of Technology.

The Academy has also worked closely with UTAR CCCD to review market demand and course participation, while exploring training programme collaborations and Micro-Credentials initiatives with TAR UMT.

- 19.3 ACCCIM Academy has fulfilled the relevant requirements to facilitate training grant applications under HRD Corp, to assist businesses in leveraging available government training resources. The Academy is therefore able to support ACCCIM working committees, Constituent Members, and partner institutions in applying for training incentives and funding. Through its network of training providers, industry experts and strategic partners, the Academy assists businesses in accessing training resources and enhancing workforce capabilities.

- 19.4 On 13 June 2026, ACCCIM Academy successfully organised its inaugural in-person programme, the “Malaysia Investment and Living Practical Masterclass”, which attracted enthusiastic participation from representatives of chambers of commerce, business associations and companies.

The programme featured Datuk Koong Lin Loong, Treasurer-General of ACCCIM, and Mr. Will Fung, Senior Foreign Counsel/Partner, Grandall Law Firm (Beijing); Principal Partner, Richard Wee Chambers (Malaysia), as speakers. They shared practical insights on Malaysia’s investment environment and policies, company establishment and business operations, tax planning and compliance matters, as well as living and long-term development opportunities in Malaysia.

The programme received encouraging feedback from participants and marked an important milestone in the Academy’s efforts to provide practical and industry-relevant training programmes.

20. SPECIAL TASK FORCE TO FACILITATE BUSINESS (PEMUDAH) AND ACCCIM MYMUDAH UNIT

- 20.1 ACCCIM continues to participate in the PEMUDAH Private Sector Meetings and offers recommendations to the government to improve investment and business conditions in Malaysia. As of 31 May 2026, ACCCIM has participated in 6 private sector meetings:

21. ACCCIM WEBINAR CUM PRESS CONFERENCE ON THE 2026 NATIONAL BUDGET

- 21.1 On the evening of the tabling of the 2026 National Budget, ACCCIM, in collaboration with Asia Television News, organised the “ACCCIM Webinar Cum Press Conference on the 2026 National Budget” to provide timely commentary on the policies and measures announced in the Budget and analyse their impact on the national economy, the business community, and small and medium enterprises (SMEs).
- 21.2 The webinar was moderated by DJ Mr. Wong Chun Pin. The panel of commentators comprised ACCCIM Treasurer Datuk Koong Lin Loong, J.P.; Deputy Chairman of the ACCCIM Commerce Committee, Mr. Ng Zhu Hann; and Executive Director of the ACCCIM Socio-Economic Research Centre (SERC), Mr. Lee Heng Guie.

- 21.3 In his opening remarks, ACCCIM President Datuk Ng Yih Png described the 2026 National Budget as a responsive and development-oriented budget that addressed the need to ease cost-of-living pressures while helping the business community navigate global economic challenges. Key measures included expanding technical and vocational education and training (TVET), promoting high-value investments in sectors such as semiconductors and the blue and green economies, accelerating the adoption of artificial intelligence and technology, strengthening research, development and innovation, and encouraging investment by micro, small and medium enterprises, as well as regional development. He also welcomed the Government's adoption of several proposals put forward by ACCCIM relating to the Market Development Grant, green energy, agricultural investment, the property sector, and accelerated capital allowances.

22. MALAYSIA'S BUSINESS AND ECONOMIC CONDITIONS SURVEYS (M-BECS)

- 22.1 During the term under review, ACCCIM and the ACCCIM Socio-Economic Research Centre (SERC) continued to jointly conduct the Malaysia Business and Economic Conditions Survey (M-BECS) and released two survey reports, covering the first half of 2025 and the outlook for the second half of 2025, as well as the second half of 2025 and the outlook for the first half of 2026. M-BECS continued to provide insights into the actual operating conditions faced by businesses, enabling ACCCIM to monitor economic and business trends and serving as an important basis for conveying the concerns of the business community to the Government and relevant agencies.
- 22.2 The survey on the first half of 2025 and the outlook for the second half of 2025 received 777 responses. It also introduced two new composite indicators, namely the Business Condition Index (BCI) and the Business Sentiment Index (BSI). The BCI for the first half of 2025 stood at 86.5, while the BSI for the second half was 97.4. Both were below the neutral level of 100, indicating that businesses remained cautious and generally pessimistic about the economic and business outlook. The key challenges faced by businesses included high operating costs, rising raw material prices, changes in consumer behaviour, weaker business and consumer confidence, and cash flow constraints. Businesses were also affected by uncertainties arising from United States tariff policies, weaker domestic and external demand, and the expanded scope of the Sales and Service Tax (SST).

The survey further indicated that businesses expected the Government to prioritise SME financing and capacity building, provide tax relief and investment incentives, and introduce more conducive tax reforms under Budget 2026. Following the implementation of the expanded SST, most businesses reported higher operating costs, lower profit margins and increased administrative burdens. They also expressed concerns over unclear regulations, difficulties in classifying taxable items and inconsistencies in official communications.

- 22.3 The survey on the second half of 2025 and the outlook for the first half of 2026 received responses from 817 companies, the vast majority of which were SMEs. The findings indicated that although the business environment remained challenging in the second half of 2025, conditions had gradually stabilised and business confidence had improved. Businesses maintained a cautious but generally positive outlook on the economic and business prospects for the first half of 2026. They continued to adopt a prudent operating approach while seeking opportunities for growth amid a complex business environment.

High operating costs remained the most significant challenge, followed by rising raw material prices, weak domestic demand and intensified market competition. The survey also highlighted delays in tax refunds, complicated foreign worker recruitment procedures, lengthy approval processes and the relatively low employment rate of Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) graduates. ACCCIM therefore continued to call on the Government to enhance policy clarity, expedite tax refunds and manpower approvals, and improve administrative efficiency and transparency through digitalisation and artificial intelligence, thereby fostering a more competitive business environment.

23. ACCCIM NATIONAL SECONDARY SCHOOL SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY AND INNOVATION COMPETITION 2025

- 23.1 It has been 19 years since ACCCIM organised the STI Competition in 2007. The objective of the competition is to inculcate the spirit of innovation and creativity in school students. The competition was opened to all Chinese Independent High Schools and SMK schools for participation. Students can submit STI projects in the field of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

- 23.2 Prize Giving Ceremony of STI Competition 2025 was held on 5th December 2025, at ACCCIM Conference Room. The ceremony was presided over by Datuk Ng Yih Pyng.
- 23.3 After the preliminary round, the panel of judges shortlisted 12 teams. The Grand Finals were held on October 11, 2025, in a hybrid (online and offline) format, where teams delivered project presentations to the final-round judges. Ultimately, 7 winning teams were selected. Judges for the final round were Prof. Dato' Lee Sze Wei, Dr. Danny Ng Wee Kiat, Dr. Kwan Ban Ho, and Mr. Tan Chun Yuan.

24. ACCCIM COURTESY VISIT TO H.E. PHAM MINH CHINH, PRIME MINISTER OF VIETNAM

- 24.1 On 25 May 2025, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM led 4 council members to meet with His Excellency Pham Minh Chinh, Prime Minister of Vietnam at InterContinental Kuala Lumpur. The meeting focused on Malaysia-Vietnam economic and trade cooperation, as well as investment opportunities in both countries.

- 24.2 Also present from ACCCIM were Datuk Yap Heng Or, Vice President; Dato' Jeffery Tan, Secretary-General; Mr. Michael Chai Woon Chew, Deputy Secretary-General; and Mr. Teoh Kok Lin, Senior Adviser. On the same day, Mr. Michael Chai Woon Chew also represented ACCCIM to deliver a speech in the Malaysia-Vietnam Business Forum.

25. ACCCIM ASEAN BUSINESS MISSIONS: MYANMAR, CAMBODIA, INDONESIA AND THE PHILIPPINES

- 25.1 In conjunction with Malaysia's ASEAN Chairmanship, ACCCIM continued its series of business missions across ASEAN by visiting Myanmar, Cambodia, Indonesia, and Philippines. Together with its earlier missions to Singapore, Vietnam and Thailand, the delegation has visited a total of 7 ASEAN member countries.
- 25.2 Led by President Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, the delegation aimed to strengthen ties with local chambers and business organisations through high-level engagements and in-depth discussions on key geopolitical and economic developments, while exploring opportunities and addressing challenges in bilateral cooperation. During the missions, ACCCIM also signed MOUs with the respective local chambers to further enhance collaboration and partnership. The mission details are as follows:

- 25.3 During the trip, ACCCIM also extended invitations to the local chambers and organisations across ASEAN to participate in its three flagship events in 2025, namely the 14th Young Entrepreneurs Conference and Super Model Awards Ceremony in August, the ASEAN AI Business Summit in September, and the Inaugural ASEAN Chinese Business Leaders Summit 2025 in October. These regional events were well-received and supported by the main Chinese chambers in ASEAN.

26. LUNCHEON ENGAGEMENT BETWEEN ACCCIM AND THE THEN MINISTER OF HUMAN RESOURCES, YB STEVEN SIM CHEE KEONG

- 26.1 On 29 May 2025, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led the ACCCIM leadership in a luncheon engagement with the then Minister of Human Resources, YB Steven Sim Chee Keong. Both parties exchanged views on human-resource issues affecting the business community, including foreign-worker recruitment and management, the stamping of employment contracts, the multi-tier levy mechanism, the Progressive Wage Policy, and the scope of authority of the Department of Occupational Safety and Health.

- 26.2 ACCCIM proposed that the Ministry of Human Resources lead the establishment of a single approval mechanism or one-stop centre for foreign-worker recruitment to improve efficiency and reduce red tape. ACCCIM also proposed a comprehensive review of the stamping requirements for employment contracts, a higher exemption threshold and appropriate treatment of past non-compliance. Both sides agreed to maintain close communication and cooperation to help businesses understand policies relating to progressive wages, upskilling, training and reskilling, while safeguarding employees' interests and supporting sustainable business operations.

27. DELEGATION TO YUNNAN IN PARTICIPATION OF THE 21ST ASEAN CHINESE BUSINESS CONFERENCE

- 27.1 A delegation led by Deputy Secretary-General Mr. Boo Chin Liong, attended the 21st ASEAN Chinese Business Conference. This event was held in Mangshi, Dehong Prefecture, Yunnan, China between June 12 and 16, 2025.
- 27.2 This year's conference, which was the first to be held in Dehong Prefecture, focused on the theme "Overseas Chinese Gather in Open Yunnan, Jointly Promoting Border Area Development." More than 400 Chinese business leaders and entrepreneurs from 62 countries and regions were drawn to this event. The conference featured a variety of activities, such as investment promotion seminars, visits to industrial sites, which fostered collaboration across several key industries. The ACCCIM delegation's involvement greatly strengthened relationships with overseas Chinese business communities throughout ASEAN and created new avenues for Malaysia-China economic and trade cooperation.

28. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO CHONGQING, CHINA FOR THE INAUGURAL BELT AND ROAD OVERSEAS CHINESE COOPERATION AND DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

- 28.1 From 15 to 19 July 2025, Deputy President of ACCCIM Dato' Looi Hei Tyng led a seven-member delegation to Chongqing, China, to participate in the inaugural Belt and Road Overseas Chinese Cooperation and Development Conference. The conference was jointly organised by the All-China Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese, the Chongqing Municipal People's Government and the Sichuan Provincial People's Government and attracted more than 500 representatives from over 110 countries and regions.

29. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO THE 2025 HUNAN GLOBAL PARTNERS CONFERENCE FOR TRADE AND INVESTMENT PROMOTION

- 29.1 From 19 to 21 November 2025, ACCCIM Vice-President Mr. Kong Chiong Ung led a seven-member delegation to Changsha to participate in the 2025 Hunan Global Partners Conference for Trade and Investment Promotion. Organised by the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade Hunan Sub-Council, the conference attracted approximately 500 participants from more than 30 countries and regions.

30. JOINT STEERING COMMITTEE FOR COOPERATION AND CONSULTATION (JSCCC) BETWEEN ACCCIM AND SCCCI

- 29.1 JSCCC was established to promote exchanges and collaboration between the business communities of Malaysia and Singapore, strengthen regional economic and trade ties, as well as enhance communication and coordination on economic and business issues of mutual interest. The Committee meetings are hosted alternately by both parties each year, in Malaysia and Singapore respectively.

31. MALAYSIA-SINGAPORE BUSINESS FORUM 2025

- 31.1 ACCCIM organised the “Malaysia–Singapore Chinese Chambers of Commerce Business Forum & Corporate Visit 2025” from 16th to 17th June 2025 at The St. Regis Kuala Lumpur, with the participation of over 120 business representatives from Malaysia and Singapore. The forum was themed “Malaysia–Singapore: Building a Globally Competitive Partnership”. The Organising Committee Chairman was Mr. Teoh Kok Lin.
- 31.2 The Guest of Honor was Former Deputy Minister of Investment, Trade and Industry of Malaysia, YB Liew Chin Tong, who also delivered the keynote address. Opening speeches were delivered by Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, and Mr. Kho Choon Keng, President of Singapore Chinese Chamber of Commerce & Industry (SCCCI).

The forum featured various distinguished speakers from the business, economic and professional sectors, including:

- Datin Paduka Azalina Adham, Managing Director of Securities Commission Malaysia, who delivered a special address titled “Unlocking Opportunities in New Malaysian SFO Scheme”;
- Professor Yeah Kim Leng, Advisor to the Minister of Finance, and Ms. Lavanya Venkateswaran, Senior ASEAN Economist of OCBC Singapore, who shared insights during the session “Economic Outlook and Current Landscape of Malaysia and Singapore”;
- Dato’ Jeffrey Lai Jiun Jye, Vice President of ACCCIM / Managing Director of Kuopacific Malaysia Sdn Bhd, and Ms Yeah Lee Ching, Council Member of SCCC / Managing Director of ValueMax Group Ltd, who spoke on “Opportunities in Malaysia”;

- Professor Dr. Ong Kian-Ming, Pro Vice-Chancellor for External Engagement of Taylor’s University and Board Member of MIDA, Dato’ Vincent Tan Meng Seng, Chairman & Executive Director of Oren Sport Sdn Bhd, and Mr. Teo Ser Luck, Council Member of SCCCI and President of ISCA, who shared perspectives on “Opportunities in Singapore”.

The “Dialog with the Minister” session themed “Malaysia–Singapore: Building a Globally Competitive Partnership” and related discussion sessions were moderated by Mr. Teoh Kok Lin and Mr. Lee Heng Guie, Executive Director of ACCCIM’s Socio-Economic Research Centre.

- 31.3 Corporate visits were also arranged during the programme, including visits to KHK Group and Sunway Medical Centre, with the aim of strengthening exchanges and cooperation between Malaysian and Singaporean businesses, as well as enhancing understanding of the business environment and industrial development in both countries.
- 31.4 The forum successfully served as a high-level platform for business engagement between Malaysia and Singapore, further strengthening bilateral business ties and enhancing exchanges in areas such as investment, finance, industrial development and regional cooperation, while laying a strong foundation for future cross-border economic collaborations.

32. ACCCIM POWER CHAT 6.0: BUILDING AN EFFICIENT LOGISTICS ECOSYSTEM TO ENHANCE ECONOMIC COMPETITIVENESS

- 32.1 ACCCIM organised Power Chat 6.0, themed “Building an Efficient Logistics Ecosystem to Enhance Economic Competitiveness”, on 26 June 2025.
- 32.2 The programme provided a structured dialogue platform for the Government and the logistics industry to discuss infrastructure bottlenecks, digitalisation, talent development, cost pressures, sustainability and industry needs. Attention was given to fragmented logistics networks in Sabah and Sarawak, the need to accelerate key infrastructure and regional transport master planning, and measures to improve connectivity and reduce logistics costs in support of

balanced development between Peninsular Malaysia and East Malaysia.

- 32.3 Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, delivered the welcome remarks. A representative of the ACCCIM Logistics and Transport Committee moderated the session, while YB Loke Siew Fook, Minister of Transport, was the principal speaker. Approximately 150 participants attended.

33. ACCCIM COURTESY VISIT TO YB NGA KOR MING, MINISTER OF HOUSING AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

- 33.1 On 23 June 2025, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led an ACCCIM delegation on a courtesy visit to YB Nga Kor Ming, Minister of Housing and Local Government, in Putrajaya. The parties exchanged views on housing development, urban renewal and the expansion of the Sales and Service Tax (SST), and ACCCIM conveyed the business community's concerns and recommendations. The delegation included Tan Sri Dato' Teo Chiang Kok, Senior Adviser; Ir. Ter Leong Leng, Deputy Secretary-General; National Council members; representatives of the Construction, Property and Infrastructure Committee; and Mr. Lee Heng Guie, Executive Director of SERC.
- 33.2 ACCCIM supported the Government's efforts to protect homebuyers and proposed that the planned Urban Renewal Act adopt a fair, practical and transparent mechanism, including open tender processes for the appointment of developers. ACCCIM also highlighted the possible impact of the expanded SST on operating costs, business readiness and consumer burdens, and proposed a review of rates, higher taxable-service thresholds and broader exemptions. The Minister thanked ACCCIM for its contribution to national economic development and indicated that the views raised would be brought to the Cabinet's attention.

34. ACCCIM MEDIA NIGHT 2025

- 34.1 The ACCCIM Media Night 2025 was held on 11 June 2025 at 7.00 pm at RAMA V Restaurant, Kuala Lumpur. The event was attended by more than 150 participants, comprising ACCCIM office bearers and representatives from over 30 media organisations.
- 34.2 During the Media Night, ACCCIM announced its series of activities for the second half of 2025. For the first time, the event was jointly

hosted by an AI robot named “Xiao Mei”, showcasing ACCCIM’s application and promotion of artificial intelligence to media representatives.

- 34.3 As a gesture of appreciation for the strong support and extensive coverage provided by media organisations during the 17th World Chinese Entrepreneurs Convention (WCEC) in 2024, ACCCIM also presented certificates of appreciation to the attending media organisations.

35. WEBINAR ON MALAYSIA'S PROGRESSIVE WAGE POLICY

- 35.1 ACCCIM organised a webinar on Malaysia’s Progressive Wage Policy on 23 June 2025.
- 35.2 The webinar was designed to help SMEs understand the policy framework, eligibility requirements and employer responsibilities. It also provided practical guidance to support implementation, strengthen human-resource management and align wage growth with skills development and productivity improvements.
- 35.3 Datuk Koong Lin Loong, Treasurer of ACCCIM and Chairman of the SMEs Committee, delivered the welcome remarks. Mr. Lee Soon Thye, Senior Researcher of SERC, moderated the session, and a representative of the Employment Services Division of the Social Security Organisation’s Employment Insurance System Office served as the speaker. Approximately 200 participants attended.

36. ENGAGEMENT DINNERS BETWEEN ACCCIM AND THE EMBASSY OF THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA IN MALAYSIA (2025 & 2026)

- 36.1 Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led ACCCIM office bearers in engagement dinners with representatives of the Embassy of the People’s Republic of China in Malaysia on 23 June 2025 and 6 May 2026. The dinners facilitated exchanges on developments in China and strengthened mutual understanding, coordination and cooperation.

37. LUNCHEON MEETING BETWEEN THE ACCCIM LEGAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE AND THE MALAYSIAN BAR COUNCIL

- 37.1 The Legal Affairs Committee of The Associated Chinese Chambers of Commerce and Industry of Malaysia (ACCCIM) held a luncheon meeting on May 29, 2025, at De.Wan 1958 by Chef Wan @ The Linc KL with Tuan Mohamad Ezri Abdul Wahab, President of the Malaysian Bar Council, and several members of the Council. Attendees from the Legal Affairs Committee of ACCCIM included Chairman, Mr. Tan Kar Peng, Advisor, Michael Chai Woon Chew, and several committee members: Mr. Philip Koh Tong Ngee, Ir. Oon Chee Kheng, Ms. Kung Oi Fah, Mr. Gan Koon Ghee, and Mr. Will Fung.
- 37.2 The two sides engaged in in-depth discussions on topics such as the stamping of employment contracts under the Stamp Act 1949, nurturing the next generation of legal talent, developments in Limited Liability Partnerships (LLPs), and mutual consultation on legal reform and legal education. Both parties also explored the growing role of legal technology and artificial intelligence in the legal and business sectors. The Bar Council extended an invitation for the Legal Affairs Committee of ACCCIM to speak at the upcoming International Bar Conference in 2026.
- 37.3 Members of the Malaysian Bar Association who attended the luncheon included Mr. Anand Raj, Vice President, Mr. Sunil Lopez, Deputy Chief Executive Officer, and Mr. Subash Jai Devaraj, Special Officer to the President.

38. ACCCIM 14TH YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS CONFERENCE 2025, ACCCIM YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS SUPER MODEL AWARDS 2025, ASEAN & BEYOND: YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS DIALOGUE 2025

- 38.1 The 14th ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Conference 2025 was held on 15 August 2025 at the Connexion Conference & Event Centre (CCEC), The Vertical, Kuala Lumpur. The theme of the Conference was “Keeping a Foothold in Malaysia While Connecting ASEAN to the Global Arena.” Mr. Yeo Duen Jing served as the Organising Chairman, while YB Liew Chin Tong, Deputy Minister of Investment, Trade and Industry, was also invited to attend the Conference.
- 38.2 **Objectives**
- (a) To strengthen exchanges and connections between Malaysian young entrepreneurs and their overseas

counterparts, establish business networks and promote regional cooperation.

- (b) To provide young entrepreneurs with relevant information on the latest developments and trends in the economic and trade environment, thereby enhancing their competitiveness.

- 38.4 The conference attracted nearly 1,000 young entrepreneur representatives, including participants from more than 30 local and international youth business organizations, as well as approximately

100 youth delegates from ASEAN member countries, Japan, and China.

39. ACTIVITIES OF THE ACCCIM INTERNATIONAL TRADE AND EXPO COMMITTEE IN JOHOR

- 39.1 In conjunction with a meeting of the ACCCIM International Trade and Expo Committee, a delegation was organised to visit the southern region of Peninsular Malaysia. From 21 to 22 August 2025, Ir. Ter Leong Leng, Chairman of the Committee, led a 26-member delegation to Batu Pahat, Johor Bahru and Kulai for corporate visits and engagements with representatives of the Johor-Singapore Special Economic Zone, the Batu Pahat Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry and the Johor Bahru Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

40. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO BEIJING, CHINA

- 40.1 From 1 to 6 July 2025, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led an 18-member delegation to Beijing. The delegation held engagements with the Investment Section of the Embassy of Malaysia in China, the Overseas Chinese Affairs Office of the State Council, the All-China Federation of Industry and Commerce, the All-China Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese, the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade, the Beijing Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese and the China Federation of Overseas Chinese Entrepreneurs.
- 40.2 During the visit, ACCCIM signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Beijing Overseas Chinese Chamber of Commerce, visited Peking University and participated in a high-level dialogue at Cheung Kong Graduate School of Business.

41. ACCCIM PARTICIPATION IN THE 3RD CHINA INTERNATIONAL SUPPLY CHAIN EXPO IN BEIJING

- 41.1 From 15 to 17 July 2025, Dato' Jeffrey Lai Jiun Jye, Vice-President of ACCCIM, led an 11-member delegation to Beijing to attend the welcome and networking dinner and opening ceremony of the 3rd China International Supply Chain Expo.
- 41.2 The delegation was also invited to participate in the "Connecting Inner Mongolia" economic and trade matchmaking session and an

international cooperation exchange organised by the China Chamber of International Commerce, at which ACCCIM representatives delivered remarks.

42. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO THE WORLD ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE CONFERENCE IN SHANGHAI

- 42.1 ACCCIM organised a 23-member delegation to the 2025 World Artificial Intelligence Conference in Shanghai from 26 to 27 July 2025. The delegation was led by Dato' Jeffrey Lai Jiun Jye, Vice-President of ACCCIM, while Mr. David Lim Tao Cheng, Chairman of the Artificial Intelligence Committee, served as Organising Chairman. ACCCIM representatives attended the opening ceremony, at which Premier Li Qiang delivered the keynote address.
- 42.2 Delegates represented the technology, finance, manufacturing and services sectors. The mission aimed to strengthen Malaysia-China cooperation in artificial intelligence, digital technology and innovation, and to explore cross-border industry collaboration and commercialisation opportunities. The delegation visited the exhibition, which covered more than 70,000 square metres and featured over 800 exhibitors.
- 42.3 The programme included visits to AI and technology companies and institutions involved in electric vertical take-off and landing aircraft, robotics, digital content, smart retail, digital assets and big-data analytics. The delegation also explored future exchanges and cooperation in emerging technology industries.
- 42.4 The delegation engaged with the Shanghai Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese and continued its visits with the support of the Federation. Both sides exchanged views on Malaysia-China economic, cultural and technological cooperation.
- 42.5 The mission expanded ACCCIM's network with technology enterprises and institutions in Shanghai and provided a stronger foundation for industry matching and regional AI ecosystem development.

43. ASEAN AI BUSINESS SUMMIT 2025

- 43.1 ACCCIM organised the ASEAN AI Business Summit 2025 on 12 September 2025 at One World Hotel, Kuala Lumpur, with the National Chamber of Commerce and Industry of Malaysia as co-

organiser. Mr. David Lim Tao Cheng, Chairman of the ACCCIM Artificial Intelligence Committee, chaired the Organising Committee. YAB Dato' Sri Fadillah Yusof, Deputy Prime Minister of Malaysia, was the Guest of Honour but was unable to attend; his speech was delivered by YB Gobind Singh Deo, Minister of Digital.

- 43.2 The Summit attracted more than 1,600 participants from 426 organisations, with the support of 35 sponsors and partners. It featured 15 exhibition booths, 40 speakers from eight countries and coverage by 10 media organisations. The programme addressed enterprise AI, public services, healthcare, smart cities and the environment, social governance, new media and entertainment, professional IT services, manufacturing and agriculture, and human resources and education.
- 43.3 Speakers and experts from Malaysia, China, Singapore, Thailand, the United States, Vietnam, Indonesia and Brunei represented organisations including Digital Domain, AI Singapore, Techsauce, ADA Space Technology, WISE AI, Accenture, Deloitte, MRANTI, Axrail and SD Guthrie. Discussions focused on AI trends, business applications, smart cities, digital transformation, energy transition and regional technology cooperation.
- 43.4 The networking dinner featured ACCCIM Power Chat 7.0, “Technology and Artificial Intelligence: Advancing the Next Phase of Business Growth in Malaysia”, with YB Chang Lih Kang, Minister of Science, Technology and Innovation, as Guest of Honour. During the dinner, the Minister and Datuk Ng Yih Pyng jointly launched the ACCCIM AI Partnership Council. The event also recognised the first cohort of 25 IEEE-certified AI assessors under a programme implemented by SIRIM.
- 43.5 ACCCIM proposed fiscal incentives, shared digital infrastructure, stronger AI talent development and a “Generative AI Navigator” programme to support SME adoption of artificial intelligence under Budget 2026.
- 43.6 The Summit created a regional platform linking governments, businesses, academia and technology stakeholders, and demonstrated Malaysia’s aspiration to develop as an ASEAN AI hub.

44. ACCCIM DELEGATION COURTESY VISIT TO THE SPEAKER OF THE DEWAN RAKYAT

- 44.1 On 11 September 2025, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led a delegation of approximately 30 National Council and Young Entrepreneurs Committee members to Parliament and paid a courtesy visit to Tan Sri Dato' Dr. Johari Abdul, Speaker of the Dewan Rakyat. The parties exchanged views on the 46th ASEAN Inter-Parliamentary Assembly (AIPA-46). The Speaker highlighted Malaysia's education and language capabilities, inclusive multicultural environment, political stability and public security as strengths in attracting foreign investment and serving as a gateway to ASEAN.
- 44.2 Datuk Ng expressed ACCCIM's full support for AIPA-46, including the participation of more than 100 ACCCIM representatives. ACCCIM also proposed that Parliamentary Special Select Committees invite external subject-matter experts to strengthen policy deliberations. The Speaker agreed with the proposal and undertook to convey it to the respective committee chairpersons.

45. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO THE 22ND CHINA-ASEAN EXPO

- 45.1 From 15 to 18 September 2025, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led a 17-member delegation to Nanning, China, to attend the opening ceremony of the 22nd China-ASEAN Expo and the China-ASEAN Business and Investment Summit.
- 45.2 The delegation visited Qinzhou, China, from 15 to 16 September 2025.
- 45.3 On 18 September 2025, YAB Dato' Sri Fadillah Yusof, Deputy Prime Minister of Malaysia, and his spouse attended a networking dinner hosted by ACCCIM in Nanning.

46. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO THE SME CONFERENCE & INFOCOMM COMMERCE CONFERENCE (SMEICC) 2025

- 46.1 Organised by the Singapore Chinese Chamber of Commerce & Industry (SCCCI), the two-day SME Conference & Infocomm Commerce Conference (SMEICC) 2025 was held on 3 and 4 September 2025 at the Suntec Singapore Convention & Exhibition Centre.
- 46.2 The conference gathered approximately 4,000 participants from around the world to explore how small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) can collaborate and achieve mutual success in a rapidly

evolving global business landscape. Singapore's Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dr. Vivian Balakrishnan, officiated the opening ceremony as Guest of Honour. The event also featured more than 50 exhibitors.

- 46.3 Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM was unable to attend as he was in Beijing to participate in the 80th Anniversary of the Victory of the Chinese People's War of Resistance Against Japanese Aggression and the World Anti-Fascist War Military Parade. The delegation was therefore led by Vice-President Datuk Yap Heng Or, who headed a 29-member delegation to the conference. He was also invited as a speaker at the first day's featured fireside chat session titled "Navigating the New Global Order: Southeast Asia's Prospects Amid Volatility and Complexity," where he engaged in discussion with vice presidents of Chinese chambers of commerce from various Southeast Asian countries and the session moderator.

47. ACCCIM 8-DAY-7-NIGHT AGRICULTURE AND AQUACULTURE STUDY MISSION TO TAIWAN

- 47.1 ACCCIM organised an eight-day, seven-night agriculture and aquaculture study mission to Taiwan from 2 to 9 September 2025.
- 47.2 The mission provided participants with exposure to Taiwan's experience and technologies in smart agriculture and aquaculture, including technical standards, systems applications and regulatory compliance. It also explored investment and cooperation opportunities in agriculture, aquaculture and downstream food industries.
- 47.3 Led by Dato' Chin Boon Tak, Chairman of the ACCCIM Agriculture and Aquaculture Committee, the delegation engaged with industry associations representing fishing nets and equipment, agricultural facilities, tuna and aquatic seedlings. Visits were also made to professional firms, orchid farms, a university poultry demonstration farm, a fishery production cooperative and processing plant, an agricultural-technology company and a milkfish farm.

48. INAUGURAL ASEAN CHINESE BUSINESS LEADERS' SUMMIT 2025

- 48.1 ACCCIM organised the Inaugural ASEAN Chinese Business Leaders' Summit 2025 from 6 to 7 October 2025 at One World Hotel, Petaling Jaya. The Summit brought together more than 700 entrepreneurs and business leaders from all 10 ASEAN member countries, Hong Kong, the United Arab Emirates, and Timor-Leste

to explore new opportunities in regional economic cooperation and trade development. The Summit centred around five core segments, namely Welcoming Dinner, Business Matching, ASEAN Business Summit, Ministerial Roundtable and ASEAN Pinnacle Night. The Summit serves as key platforms to foster dialogue, collaboration, and regional business synergy.

The strategic partner of the Summit was UOB Malaysia, with a total of 23 sponsors supporting the event, including four sponsor booths showcased at the venue. The Organising Chairman was Datuk Koong Lin Loong, Treasurer of ACCCIM.

- 48.2 On 6 October 2025, ACCCIM hosted the Welcoming Dinner at Grand Imperial Restaurant @ The Club to celebrate the arrival of over 60 overseas delegates. YB Nga Kor Ming, Minister of Housing and Local Government, was invited as the Guest of Honour.
- 48.3 The Business Matching session of the Summit was successfully held on the morning of 7 October 2025 at One World Hotel, marking the commencement of the Summit's second-day programme. YB Lim Hui Ying, Deputy Minister of Finance graced the session as Guest of Honour. Through an efficient business matching system and extensive corporate network, the session facilitated strategic partnerships across multiple industries and promoted greater regional business collaboration towards a more inclusive and sustainable ASEAN economic ecosystem.

The business matching session covered six major sectors, namely automotive, consumer products, food and agriculture, medical and healthcare, information technology, and services. A total of 273 local and international companies participated, resulting in the signing of 51 MOUs with an estimated cross-border collaboration value exceeding RM100 million (USD21 million). Participating companies involved in successful business matching partnerships came from Timor-Leste, Laos, Vietnam, Singapore, China, the United Arab Emirates, Malaysia, Cambodia, and Myanmar.

- 48.4 The third segment of the Summit was the ASEAN Business Forum, with YB Loke Siew Fook, Minister of Transport as our Guest of Honour. The forum featured two panel discussions titled "Navigating Headwinds: ASEAN Business Strategies amidst Geopolitical Uncertainty" and "Legacy and Innovation: Succession Strategies for Long-Term Growth". Representatives from Chinese Chambers of Commerce across ASEAN were invited as speakers to share insights on macroeconomic trends, industrial transformation, and family business governance, while focusing on how ASEAN enterprises

could balance growth with responsibility, and succession with innovation, while collectively build a more resilient and sustainable regional economic ecosystem amid an increasingly complex global landscape.

- 48.5 The fourth segment of the Summit was Ministerial Roundtable, a closed-door session that was originally scheduled to be officiated by YB Tengku Datuk Seri Utama Zafrul Tengku Abdul Aziz, Minister of Investment, Trade and Industry. However, due to unforeseen circumstances, he was represented by the YB Liew Chin Tong, Deputy Minister of Investment, Trade and Industry. The session was exclusively attended by top leaders of Chinese Chambers of Commerce from ASEAN countries, Hong Kong, Timor-Leste, and the United Arab Emirates, as well as recipients of the ASEAN Outstanding Entrepreneur and ASEAN Honorable Business Icon.

Discussions centred on key global economic developments, including the United States' reciprocal tariff policies, China's "Dual Circulation" economic restructuring strategy, as well as ASEAN's role in maintaining regional competitiveness and resilience amidst global uncertainty.

- 48.6 ASEAN Pinnacle Night marked the grand finale of the Summit. YB Tan Sri Dato' Dr. Johari Abdul, Speaker of the Dewan Rakyat, attended as the Guest of Honour and witness to a special token presentation ceremony held in recognition of the outstanding contributions of Chinese entrepreneurs across ASEAN in advancing shared regional prosperity and sustainable economic growth.

A total of 15 prominent Chinese entrepreneurs were conferred the ASEAN Outstanding Entrepreneur, including one recipient who received the Summit's highest recognition - ASEAN Honorable Business Icon.

52. 18TH WORLD CHINESE ENTREPRENEURS' CONVENTION

- 52.1 From 2 to 5 November 2025, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led a 106-member delegation to Macao for the 18th

World Chinese Entrepreneurs Convention. Hosted by the Macao Chamber of Commerce at The Venetian Macao and the Galaxy International Convention Center, the Convention was themed “Working Together to Build a Shared Future for Chinese Entrepreneurs” and attracted more than 4,000 Chinese entrepreneurs, scholars, experts, government officials and business leaders from over 50 countries and regions.

- 52.2 During the Convention, Datuk Ng attended a meeting between Mr. Sam Hou Fai, Chief Executive of the Macao Special Administrative Region, and members of the WCEC Advisory Committee at the Government Headquarters. He also led ACCCIM office bearers in an engagement with a delegation from the Hubei Overseas Friendship Association.

53 ACCCIM’S PARTICIPATION IN THE 8TH CHINA INTERNATIONAL IMPORT EXPO (CIIE)

- 53.1 The 8th China International Import Expo (CIIE) held in Shanghai, China, from 5th November to 10th November 2025. Deputy President of ACCCIM, Dato’ Looi Hei Tyng led an ACCCIM delegation of 169 participants. Members of the delegation included Dato’ Jeffrey Lai Jiun Jye, Vice-President of ACCCIM, Mr. Ter Leong Leng, Deputy Secretaries-General, National Council Member Mr. Kenny Lim Seng Lee, Mr. Lee Toong Leon, Dato’ Sri Dr. Lim Chin Fui, Mr. Michael Leong Jit Min, Members of Young Entrepreneurs Committee (YEC) from across Malaysia and business representatives.

- 53.2 According to CIIE statistics, a total of 180 enterprises and organisations have participated in all eight editions of the Expo and are recognised as “full attendance participants.” ACCCIM is among them and remains the only organising institution from Malaysia to have participated in every edition without interruption. A total of 13 companies and 29 booths participate in ACCCIM pavilion, which located at Food and Agricultural Products area. ACCCIM pavilion showcasing a wide range of high-quality Malaysian products including bird nest, wine, beverages, chocolate ingredients and other.

53.3 Launch Ceremony of the “Big Market for All • Export to China” Series of Activities

On 4 November 2025, Ir. Ter Leong Leng represented ACCCIM at the launch ceremony of the “Big Market for All • Export to China” series of activities, organised by the Ministry of Commerce of China at National Exhibition and Convention Center (Shanghai). H.E. Mr. Li Qiang, Premier of the People’s Republic of China attended the

event and officially launched the programme, while Minister of Commerce Mr. Wang Wentao delivered the keynote address.

53.10 Young Entrepreneurs Section Business Visits and Activities

On 6th November 2025, Chairman of ACCCIM YEC, Mr. Lee Toong Leon and Yao Heng, Chairman of the Shanghai Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese Youth formally signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU).

On 7th November 2025, Mr. Nic Khew Chuen Yee, Deputy Chairman of ACCCIM YEC led a delegation of 40 members on corporate visits to AGIBOT Innovation (Shanghai) Technology Co., Ltd., Fourier Intelligence Technology Co., Ltd, and Zhangjiang Robot Valley.

Both parties exchanged views on the development of Malaysia–China economic and trade cooperation, as well as the latest developments within the Malaysian Chinese community. ACCCIM also hosted a dinner in honor of the visiting delegation and invited YB Nga Kor Ming, Minister of Housing and Local Government, to attend the dinner.

55. ACCCIM YEC DELEGATION VISIT TO GUANGZHOU, CHINA

- 55.1 From 14 to 17 December 2025, the ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Committee (YEC) organised a four-day, three-night business and exchange mission to Guangzhou, China, led by YEC Chairman, Dato’ Leon Lee, with a 30-member delegation.
- 55.2 The mission received strong support from the Guangdong Provincial Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese. During the visit, the delegation paid courtesy calls on the Guangdong Provincial Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese and the Guangdong International Overseas Chinese Chamber of Commerce, and participated in an exchange session with young Chinese entrepreneurs, where discussions focused on business development, market opportunities and potential areas of collaboration, further strengthening ties between both sides.
- 55.3 The delegation also visited several Chinese enterprises and institutions, including Nansha CAS Smart City, the “Going Global” Comprehensive Service Center for Chinese Enterprises, Fulconn Vanguard, GAC Aion, and the Green Shore Project under the Fok Ying Tung Group. These visits provided valuable insights into the latest developments and best practices in technological innovation, industrial development, and market expansion in China.

- 55.4 During the visit, the delegation also met with representatives from the Guangzhou offices of the Malaysian Investment Development Authority (MIDA) and the Malaysia External Trade Development Corporation (MATRADE) to exchange views on Malaysia-China investment and trade development trends, while exploring opportunities for business collaboration and market expansion between the two countries.

57. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO GUANGDONG PROVINCE, CHINA

- 58.1 From 19th to 22nd January 2026, ACCCIM, led by President Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, headed a 15-member delegation to Guangdong Province, China, aimed to further deepening Malaysia-Guangdong economic and trade ties.

- 58.2 The delegation paid courtesy visits to eight organisations and agencies, which are the Guangdong Provincial Department of Commerce, Guangdong Overseas Friendship Association, Guangdong Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese, Guangdong Federation of Industry and Commerce, China Council for the Promotion of International Trade Guangdong Committee (CCPIT Guangdong), Guangdong International Chinese Entrepreneurs Association, Guangdong High-Tech Industry Chamber of Commerce, and the Nansha District Government. - 58.1 From 21 to 25 January 2026, Dato’ Lee Toong Leon, Chairman of the ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Committee, led a 37-member delegation to Yunnan University of Finance and Economics for the Malaysian Chinese Young Leaders Training Programme. The five-day, four-night programme was jointly organised by ACCCIM and the Yunnan Federation of Returned Overseas Chinese and co-organised by the Federation’s Youth Committee, the ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Committee and the University.
- 58.2 The programme covered artificial intelligence, cross-border e-commerce, data assets, and investment opportunities and challenges in Yunnan. Corporate and study visits on 24 January included the Zheng He Museum, Yunnan Baiyao Group and the Kunming Planning Exhibition Hall.
- 58.3 The programme enhanced participants’ understanding of the Yunnan market and technological development and strengthened links and future cooperation opportunities between young entrepreneurs from Malaysia and China.

59. FAREWELL LUNCHEON FOR MINISTER-COUNSELLOR MA CUIHONG OF THE EMBASSY OF CHINA IN MALAYSIA

- 59.1 On 7 February 2026, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, hosted a farewell luncheon for Minister-Counsellor Ma Cuihong of the Embassy of the People's Republic of China in Malaysia and expressed appreciation for her support and assistance to ACCCIM during her tenure.

60. ACCCIM CHINESE NEW YEAR GALA DINNER 2026

- 60.1 The ACCCIM Chinese New Year Gala Dinner 2026 was held on Wednesday, 11 February 2026, at the Sunway Resort Hotel ballroom, with YAB Dato' Seri Anwar Ibrahim, Prime Minister of Malaysia, as Guest of Honour. The 70-table dinner attracted nearly 700 guests, including government leaders, ambassadors and high commissioners, prominent business leaders, major Chinese associations, national business organisations and senior media representatives.
- 60.2 Dato' Jeffery Tan served as Organising Chairman. The dinner celebrated the Chinese New Year and provided a platform to strengthen engagement among stakeholders and deepen ACCCIM's cooperation with the Prime Minister and Cabinet members in support of economic and social development.
- 60.3 Cabinet ministers and deputy ministers in attendance included YB Loke Siew Fook, YB Nga Kor Ming, YB Chang Lih Kang, YB Steven Sim Chee Keong, YB Fadhlina Sidek, YB Datuk Seri Tiong King Sing, YB Datuk Aaron Ago Dagang, YB Dr. Mohammed Taufiq Johari, YB Hannah Yeoh, YB Datuk Seri Amir Hamzah Azizan and YB Datuk Seri R. Ramanan.

- 61.1 On 11 February 2026, Dato' Seri Choot Ewe Seng, Vice-President of ACCCIM, led an 11-member delegation from the ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Committee to Parliament for a courtesy visit to YB Dr. Mohammed Taufiq Johari, Minister of Youth and Sports.
- 61.2 Both parties discussed youth economic development and entrepreneurship and explored stronger support systems for young entrepreneurs and regional cooperation platforms. The Ministry highlighted the Rakan Muda programme and assistance and development initiatives for young entrepreneurs.

- 61.3 The delegation also toured Parliament to gain a better understanding of Malaysia's administrative and legislative system.

62. ACCCIM YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS COMMITTEE COURTESY VISIT TO YB STEVEN SIM CHEE KEONG, MINISTER OF ENTREPRENEUR DEVELOPMENT AND COOPERATIVES

- 62.1 On 12 March 2026, Dato' Seri Choot Ewe Seng, Vice-President of ACCCIM, led an 11-member delegation from the ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Committee on a courtesy visit to YB Steven Sim Chee Keong, Minister of Entrepreneur Development and Cooperatives.
- 62.2 The parties discussed SME development planning, youth entrepreneurship and the entry of foreign enterprises into the Malaysian market. The Minister encouraged ACCCIM to submit recommendations on youth entrepreneurship to the relevant government agencies to strengthen the youth development and entrepreneurship ecosystem.
- 62.3 Participants included leaders and Central Committee members of the ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Committee and representatives of SME Corp. Malaysia.

63. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO SHANDONG

- 63.1 Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led a delegation to Shandong from March 29 to April 3, 2026.
- 63.2 On March 29, 2026, Mr. Deng Yunfeng, Member of the Standing Committee of the Shandong Provincial Party Committee and Minister of the United Front Work Department, met with the delegation in Jinan. During this meeting, both parties achieved significant consensus on various aspects of economic and trade cooperation, as well as cultural and interpersonal exchanges. Key agreements included the establishment of a joint committee, enhanced support services for international business expansion, increased engagement between small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and emerging entrepreneurs, and deepened collaboration in the fields of agriculture, industrial development, artificial intelligence, and educational programs. - 63.5 On April 3, 2026, the delegation visited Qingdao and was received by Ms. Song Tiantian, Director of the Municipal Foreign Affairs Office. Both parties engaged in comprehensive discussions concerning healthcare and wellness, artificial intelligence, and industrial cooperation.

64. ACCCIM ATTENDANCE AT THE OPENING RECEPTION OF THE 139TH CHINA IMPORT AND EXPORT FAIR IN GUANGZHOU

- 65.1 The ACCCIM AI Partnership Council successfully organised its first webinar of the year, entitled "AI Fundamentals and How SMEs Can Apply OpenClaw Agents", on 17 April 2026. The webinar was presented by Mr. Goh Seng Tak, Deputy Chairman of the ACCCIM AI Committee, and Dr. Tee Hwee Sze, Member of the ACCCIM AI Committee. It attracted more than 200 participants from member companies, reflecting the business community's strong interest in acquiring knowledge and adapting to the rapid advancement of artificial intelligence.
- 65.2 During the webinar, Mr. Goh provided an overview of the development of artificial intelligence and demonstrated how generative AI tools could transform an initial idea into a workable

prototype through natural-language interaction, covering requirements planning, interface design and preliminary code generation. Dr. Tee explained that autonomous AI agents could significantly improve decision-making and operational efficiency, while emphasising the importance of maintaining human oversight, final approval and ethical safeguards. The webinar concluded with an active question-and-answer session, and the feedback received would serve as a useful reference for future AI workshops aimed at supporting SMEs in accelerating digital transformation and innovation.

66. ACCCIM INTERACTION SESSION WITH ASSOCIATE MEMBERS 2026

- 66.1 The “2026 ACCCIM Interaction Session with Associate Members” was held on 20 April 2026 at the UOB Multi-Purpose Hall. More than 150 participants from 26 business associations attended. A special forum entitled “Oil Crisis Ahead: Are Businesses Prepared?” was organised. The session also served as a platform for discussion and exchange of views on the wish lists and proposals submitted by Associate Members for the 2027 National Budget.

67. ACCCIM COURTESY VISIT TO YB DATUK SERI JOHARI ABDUL GHANI, MINISTER OF INVESTMENT, TRADE AND INDUSTRY

- 67.1 President Datuk Ng Yih Pyng led a 7-person delegation to meet with YB Datuk Seri Johari Abdul Ghani, Minister of Investment, Trade and Industries at MITI Tower on 23rd April 2026. The discussion focused on policy recommendations addressing the impact of oil shock and our recommendations, green vehicle as well as the development of SMEs. During the meeting, Datuk Ng also extended an invitation to YB Minister to serve as the Guest of Honour at ACCCIM’s AGM this year.
- 67.2 Also present from ACCCIM are Datuk Yap Heng Or, Vice President; Dato' Jeffery Tan, Secretary-General; Datuk Koong Lin Loong, Treasurer; Ir. Ter Leong Leng, Deputy Secretary-General; Datuk Son Tong Leong and Mr. Kenny Lim Seng Lee, National Council Members; as well as Mr. Lee Soon Thye, Senior Researcher of SERC.

68. GOVERNMENT-BUSINESS COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND APPRECIATION RECEPTION

- 68.1 ACCCIM organised the Government-Business Community Engagement and Appreciation Reception on 26 April 2026.
- 68.2 The event aimed to strengthen communication between the Government and the business community and promote cooperation on national economic development, business transformation and policy implementation.
- 68.3 Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, delivered the welcome remarks, while YAB Dato' Seri Dr. Ahmad Zahid Hamidi, Deputy Prime Minister, was the principal speaker. Approximately 200 ACCCIM members attended. ACCCIM also presented appreciation tokens to more than 30 government ministries and agencies.

69. ACCCIM INTERNATIONAL TRADE AND EXPO COMMITTEE CORPORATE VISITS TO KEDAH AND PENANG

- 69.1 From 29 to 30 April 2026, a 26-member delegation from the ACCCIM International Trade and Expo Committee undertook corporate visits in Penang and Kedah and engaged with representatives of the Penang Chinese Chamber of Commerce, Kedah Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry and Perlis Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

70. WEBINAR OF MARKET DEVELOPMENT GRANT (MDG) & REGULATIONS ON EXPORTING MALAYSIAN AGRICULTURAL AND FOOD PRODUCTS TO CHINA

- 70.1 ACCCIM organised a webinar on the Market Development Grant (MDG) and the requirements for exporting Malaysian agri-food products to China on 7 May 2026. Ir. Ter Leong Leng, Deputy Secretary-General of ACCCIM and Chairman of the International Trade and Exhibition Committee, delivered the welcome remarks. Speakers from MATRADE and a biosafety consultancy briefed approximately 60 online participants.
- 70.2 The webinar helped businesses understand the MDG application process and the rules and procedures applicable to the export of

Malaysian agri-food products to China, thereby supporting market expansion.

71. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO NANJING AND CHANGCHUN, CHINA

- 71.1 From 13 to 15 May 2026, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led a 17-member delegation to Nanjing and Changchun, China. The delegation undertook a series of economic and trade engagements with local united-front authorities, federations of industry and commerce, commerce departments, overseas Chinese affairs offices, major enterprises and business organisations, creating opportunities for future Malaysia-China trade cooperation and two-way investment.
- 71.2 The delegation included ACCCIM office bearers, National Council members, Young Entrepreneurs Committee leaders, representatives of the Agriculture and Aquaculture Committee and Digital Economy and Entrepreneurship Committee, and Secretariat representatives.

72. ACCCIM DELEGATION TO HARBIN, CHINA FOR THE 35TH HARBIN INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC AND TRADE FAIR

- 72.1 From 16 to 19 May 2026, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM led a 83-member delegation to Harbin, Heilongjiang Province, China, to participate in the 35th Harbin International Economic and Trade Fair (HTF), in full support of Malaysia's role as the Guest Country of Honour. This HTF was a government-to-government (G2G) initiative between Malaysia and China. ACCCIM participated as a supporting organisation at the invitation of Malaysia's Ministry of Housing and Local Government.
- 72.2 From 16 to 18 May, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, led an ACCCIM delegation in a series of economic and trade engagements in Harbin. These included delivering remarks at the launch ceremony of the "Entrepreneurship in China · Innovation in Heilongjiang" programme, meeting with Mr. Liu Zhenguo, Member of the Standing Committee of the CPC Heilongjiang Provincial Committee and Head of the United Front Work Department, hosting a networking dinner, and officiating at the opening of the Malaysia Guest of Honour Pavilion at the Harbin International Economic and Trade Fair. The delegation also visited Harbin Institute of Technology and signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the

university. It subsequently split into groups to inspect agricultural products in Wuchang City, visit enterprises in the Harbin New Area, and participate in a Malaysia–China young entrepreneurs exchange programme, further strengthening bilateral cooperation in trade, education, agriculture and youth entrepreneurship.

73. ACCCIM ATTENDANCE AT THE 2026 GLOBAL TRADE AND INVESTMENT PROMOTION SUMMIT IN BEIJING

- 73.1 On 19 May 2026, Datuk Ng Yih Pyng, President of ACCCIM, accompanied by a Vice-Chairman of the ACCCIM Young Entrepreneurs Committee, attended the 2026 Global Trade and Investment Promotion Summit organised by the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade at the Diaoyutai State Guesthouse in Beijing.
- 73.2 Datuk Ng was the only representative from an ASEAN country invited to speak at the plenary forum on new quality productive forces and global industrial and supply-chain cooperation. He delivered ACCCIM’s perspectives on international economic and trade cooperation, industrial and supply-chain collaboration and regional economic opportunities.

74. AGRICULTURE AND AQUACULTURE COMMITTEE STUDY MISSION TO THAILAND

- 74.1 ACCCIM organised an eight-day, seven-night agriculture and aquaculture study mission to Bangkok, Thailand, from 25 May to 1 June 2026.
- 74.2 The mission provided exposure to Thailand’s experience and technologies in smart agriculture and aquaculture, enhanced participants’ understanding of technical standards, systems applications and compliance, and explored investment and cooperation opportunities in agriculture, aquaculture and downstream food industries.
- 74.3 Led by Dato’ Chin Boon Tak, Chairman of the ACCCIM Agriculture and Aquaculture Committee, the delegation visited THAIFEX-Anuga Asia 2026, the National Food Institute of Thailand, Charoen Pokphand Group, Betagro Group, the Thailand Institute of Scientific and Technological Research, MATRADE Bangkok, an agro-industry

institute under the Federation of Thai Industries, local agricultural cooperatives, agritourism projects and major wholesale markets.

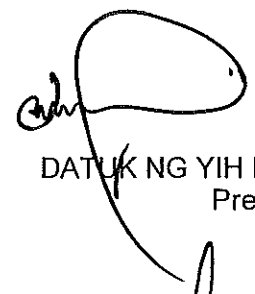

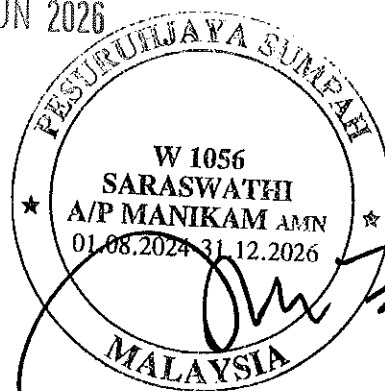

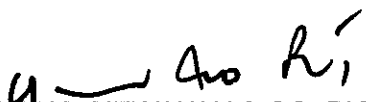

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - DECEMBER 31, 2025

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Associated Chinese Chambers of Commerce and Industry of Malaysia ("Chamber") is registered under Societies Act 1966 and domiciled in Malaysia.

The registered address and principal place at which activities are carried out is located at 6th Floor, Wisma Chinese Chamber, 258 Jalan Ampang, 50450 Kuala Lumpur.

The financial statements were approved and authorised for issue by the Executive Council on June 18, 2026.

2. PRINCIPAL OBJECTIVES

The principal objectives of the Chamber are as follows :-

- 2.1 To promote liaison and cooperation among the various Chinese Chambers of Commerce and Industry, trade and/or industrial Chambers and/or business corporations in Malaysia for the protection and advancement of the interests of their members in respect of commerce, industry, primary industries and other economic activities;
- 2.2 To study and formulate views, observations and recommendations of the Malaysian Chinese business community in respect of the nation's socio-economic development, so as to promote better understanding between the community and the Government and other public/private sector organisations, and in furtherance of this objective, to contribute towards the development of national economy and promotion of national unity;
- 2.3 To collect, collate and disseminate information relating to commerce, industry and other economic sectors;
- 2.4 To liaise with other Chambers of Commerce or economic organisations, in particular to organise or participate in meetings relating to economic matters, trade missions, exhibitions and other activities relevant to the promotion of economic cooperation;
- 2.5 To promote social welfare activities as well as organise or sponsor manpower training programmes or seminars beneficial to the economic development of the nation;
- 2.6 To arbitrate in the matter of disputes between members of ACCCIM (with the consent of both parties);
- 2.7 To receive and/or accept donations, gifts, grants, subsidies, securities listed in the stock exchange and any other instruments of value and to hold the same for investment and/or deal with the same; and
- 2.8 To perform any other services pertinent to the functions of ACCCIM.

3. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

3.1 Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the Group and of the Chamber have been prepared in accordance with Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS"), International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") and the requirements of the Constitution of the Association.

3.2 New and revised MFRSs affecting amounts reported and/or disclosures in the financial statements

In the current year, the Group and the Chamber have applied a number of new and amendments to MFRSs issued by the Malaysian Accounting Standards Board ("MASB") that are mandatorily effective for an accounting period that begins on or after January 1, 2025.

The adoption of the new and amendments to MFRSs did not have any significant effect on the financial statements of the Group and the Chamber.

3.3 Basis of measurement

The financial statements of the Group and of the Chamber have been prepared on the historical cost basis unless otherwise stated in the accounting policies below.

3.4 Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia ("RM"), which is the Group and the Chamber functional currency.

4. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

4.1 Subsidiary and basis of consolidation

Subsidiary

A subsidiary is an entity over which the Group has all the following:

- (i) Power over the investee (i.e. existing rights that give it the current ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee);
- (ii) Exposure, or rights, to variable returns from its investment with the investee; and
- (iii) The ability to use its power over the investee to affect its returns.

In the Chamber's separate financial statements, investments in subsidiary are stated at cost less impairment loss. On disposal of such investment, the difference between net disposal proceed and its carrying amounts is included in profit or loss.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the Chamber and its subsidiary as at the reporting date. The financial statement of the subsidiary used in the preparation of the consolidated financial statements are prepared for the same reporting date as the Chamber. Consistent accounting policies are applied for liked transactions and events in similar circumstances.

Subsidiary is consolidated when the Chamber obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Chamber loses control of the subsidiary.

All intra-group balances, income and expenses and unrealised gains and losses resulting from intra-group transactions are eliminated in full. Where necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiary to ensure consistency of accounting policies with those of the Group.

(a) Business combinations

Acquisition of subsidiary is accounted for using the acquisition method. The cost of an acquisition is measured as the aggregate of the consideration transferred, measured at acquisition date fair value and the amount of any non-controlling interests in the acquiree. For each business combination, the Chamber elects on a transaction-by-transaction basis whether to measure the non-controlling interests in the acquiree either at fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. Transaction costs incurred are expensed and included in administrative expenses.

Any contingent consideration to be transferred by the acquirer will be recognised at fair value at the acquisition date. Subsequent changes in the fair value of the contingent consideration which is deemed to be an asset or liability, will be recognised in profit or loss or as a change to other comprehensive income. If the contingent consideration is classified as equity, it will not be remeasured. Subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity.

When the Group acquires a business, it assess the financial assets and liabilities assumed for appropriate classification and designation in accordance with the contractual terms, economic circumstances and pertinent conditions as at the acquisition date. This includes the separation of embedded derivatives in host contracts by the acquiree.

If the business combination is achieved in stages, the acquisition date fair value of the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquiree is remeasured to fair value at the acquisition date through profit or loss.

Goodwill is initially measured at cost being the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred and the amount recognised for non-controlling interests over the net identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. If this consideration is lower than fair value of the net assets of the subsidiary acquired, the difference is recognised in profit or loss.

(b) Changes in ownership interests in subsidiary without change of control

Changes in the Group's ownership interests in subsidiary that do not result in the Group losing control over the subsidiary is accounted for as equity transactions. The carrying amounts of the Group's interests and the non-controlling interests are adjusted to reflect the changes in their relative interests in the subsidiary. The resulting difference is recognised directly in equity and attributed to owner of the Chamber.

(c) Loss of control

When the Group loses control of a subsidiary, a gain or loss calculated as the difference between:-

- (i) The aggregate of the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any retained interests in the former subsidiary and,
- (ii) The previous carrying amount of the assets and liabilities of the subsidiary and any non-controlling interests, is recognised in profit or loss.

The subsidiary's cumulative gain or loss which has been recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity are reclassified to profit or loss or where applicable, transferred directly to retained earnings. The fair value of any investment retained in the former subsidiary at the date control is lost is regarded as the cost on initial recognition of the investment.

4.2 Financial instruments

(i) Initial recognition and measurement

The Group and Chamber recognises a financial asset or a financial liability (including derivative instruments) in the statement of financial position when, and only when, an entity in the Group and the Chamber becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial assets and financial liabilities are measured at fair value plus transaction costs if the financial asset or financial liability is not measured at fair value through profit or loss. For instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss when incurred.

(ii) Derecognition of financial instruments

For derecognition purposes, the Group and the Chamber first determines whether a financial asset or a financial liability should be derecognised in its entirety as a single item or derecognised part-by-part of a single item or of a group of similar items.

A financial asset, whether as a single item or as a part, is derecognised when, and only when, the contractual rights to receive the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the Group and the Chamber transfers the contractual rights to receive cash flows of the financial asset, including circumstances when the Group and the Chamber acts only as a collecting agent of the transferee, and retains no significant risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset or no continuing involvement in the control of the financial asset transferred.

A financial liability is derecognised when, and only when, it is legally extinguished, which is either when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. A substantial modification of the terms of an existing financial liability is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability. For this purpose, the Group and the Chamber considers a modification as substantial if the present value of the revised cash flows of the modified terms discounted at the original effective interest rate is different by 10% or more when compared with the carrying amount of the original liability.

4.3 Financial assets

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, the Group and the Chamber classifies financial assets into three measurement categories, namely:

- (i) Financial assets at amortised cost (AC);
- (ii) Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI); and
- (iii) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL).

The classification is based on the Group and the Chamber activities model objective for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial instruments.

After initial recognition, the Group and the Chamber measures financial assets, as follows:

- (i) **Financial assets at amortised cost** - A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if:
 - (a) it is held within the Group's and the Chamber's business objective to hold the asset only to collect contractual cash flows, and
 - (b) the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principle and interest in principal outstanding.

- (ii) **Financial assets at FVOCI** - A financial asset is measured at FVOCI if:
 - (a) it is held within the Group's and the Chamber's business objective to hold the asset both to collect contractual cash flows and selling the financial asset,
 - (b) the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principle and interest in principal outstanding.
- (iii) **Financial assets at FVPL** - A financial asset is measured at FVPL if it is an equity investment, held for trading (including derivative assets) or if it does not meet any of the condition specified for the AC or FVOCI model.

Other than financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss, all other financial assets are subject to review for impairment.

4.4 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definition of a financial liability.

Financial liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Group and the Chamber becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instruments. Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities at fair value through income or expense ("FVTIE") or other financial liabilities.

(a) Financial liabilities at FVTIE

Financial liabilities at FVTIE include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as FVTIE.

Financial liabilities are classified as held for trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling in the near term. This includes derivatives entered into by the Group and the Chamber that do not meet the hedge accounting criteria. Derivative liabilities are initially measured at fair value and subsequently stated at fair value, with any resultant gains or losses recognised in income or expenditure. Net gains or losses on derivatives include exchange differences.

The Group and the Chamber does not has any financial liabilities at FVTIE as at the current and previous financial year end.

(b) Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value plus directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

For other financial liabilities, gains and losses are recognised in income or expense when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortisation process.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as a derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability, and the difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in income or expense.

4.5 Impairment of financial assets

The Group and the Chamber assess at each reporting date whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired.

Other receivables and other financial assets carried at amortised cost

To determine whether there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on financial assets has been incurred, the Group and the Chamber consider factors such as the probability of insolvency or significant financial difficulties of the debtor and default or significant delay in payments. For certain categories of financial assets, such as rental receivables, assets that are assessed not to be impaired individually are subsequently assessed for impairment on a collective basis based on similar risk characteristics. Objective evidence of impairment for a portfolio of receivables could include the Group's and Chamber's past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period and observable changes national or local economic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

If any such evidence exists, the amount of impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in profit or losses.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of rental receivables, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When a rental receivable becomes uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account.

If in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previous recognised impairment loss is reversed to the extent that the carrying amount of the asset does not exceed its amortised cost at the reversal date. The amount of reversal is recognised in profit or losses.

4.6 Impairment of non-financial assets

The Group and the Chamber assesses at each reporting date whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, or when an annual impairment assessment for an asset is required, the Group and the Chamber makes an estimate of the asset's recoverable amount.

An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. For the purpose of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows [i.e cash generating units ("CGU")].

In assessing values in use, the estimated future cash flows expected to be generated by the asset are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. Where the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is written down to its recoverable amount. Impairment losses recognised in income or expense in the period in which it arises.

An assessment is made at each reporting date as to whether there is any indication that previously recognised impairment losses may no longer exist or may have decreased. A previously recognised impairment loss is reversed only if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the asset's recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. If that is the case, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to its recoverable amount. That increase cannot exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, had no impairment loss been recognised previously. Such reversal is recognised in income or expense.

4.7 Investment property carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment

The Group and the Chamber recognises a land, building (including a floor of a building), or both land and building, including a property under construction, as an investment property if it is held for capital appreciation, rental income or both. An investment property is recorded at cost on initial recognition. Cost of an investment property comprises purchase price plus all directly attributable costs incurred to bring the property to its present location and condition intended for use as an investment property. Cost of a self-constructed investment property comprises all direct and indirect construction costs but exclude internal profits.

The Chamber own office and shop lot held for rental income and capital appreciation purpose and not occupied by the Group and the Chamber. Investment property is carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses, as the fair value of the property cannot be reliably determined without cost or effort due to a lack of reliable evidence about comparable market transactions.

The residual value of such investment property is deemed to be nil, as its fair value cannot be measured reliably without undue cost or effort on an ongoing basis.

Office lot and shop office is depreciated on the straight line method to write off the cost to its residue value over its estimated useful life at 2% per annum.

The residual value, useful life and depreciation method of the investment property are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, if there is an indication of a change since the last reporting date.

4.8 Property, plant and equipment

(i) Recognition and measurement

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. The policy for the recognition and measurement of impairment losses is in accordance with Note 4.5.

Costs include expenditure that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. When significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any and the net carrying amount is recognised in income or expense.

(ii) Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the items if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Group and Chamber and its cost can be measured reliably. The net carrying amount of the replaced item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised with any corresponding gain or loss recognised in income or expense accordingly. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognised in income or expense as incurred.

(iii) Depreciation

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the book value/cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives at the following annual rates:

4.9 Leases

The Group and the Chamber assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

The Group and the Chamber as lessor

Leases in which the Group and the Chamber does not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of an asset are classified as operating leases. Rental income arising is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the lease terms and is included in revenue in the statement of profit or loss due to its operating nature. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised over the lease term on the same basis as rental income. Contingent rents are recognised as revenue in the period in which they are earned.

4.10 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments and are readily convertible to cash with insignificant risk of changes in value.

4.11 Payables

Payables are stated at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received.

4.12 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group and the Chamber has a present obligation as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made. Provisions are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount of a provision is the present value of the expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation.

4.13 Recognition of income

The Group and the Chamber recognises revenue when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, i.e when "control" of the goods or services underlying the particular performance obligation is transferred to the customer.

Income is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Group and the Chamber and the income can be reliably measured. Income is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

(i) Subscriptions

Subscriptions are accounted for on an accrual basis.

(ii) Donations and Contributions

Specific donations and contributions are accounted for in equity as capital contribution to respective funds on receipt basis.

(iii) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised when the shareholder's right to receive payment is established.

(iv) Rental income from investment properties and other property

Rental income is recognised based on the accrual basis or on a straight line basis unless collection is in doubt, in which case it is recognised on the receipt basis.

(v) Interest

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method.

(vi) Recovery of operating expenses

Recovery of operating expenses is recognised when the performance obligation is satisfied overtime upon services being rendered to the customers.

4.14 Employee benefits

(i) Short term benefits

Wages, salaries, bonuses and social security contributions are recognised as an expense in the financial year in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the Group and Chamber. Short term accumulating compensated absences such as paid annual leave are recognised when services are rendered by employees that increase their entitlement to future compensated absences. Short term non-accumulating compensated absences such as sick leave are recognised when the absences occur.

(ii) Defined contribution plans

Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plan are recognised as an expense in the statement of income and expenditure as incurred.

4.15 Income tax

Income tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Current tax is the expected amount of income taxes payable in respect of the taxable profit for the year and is measured using the tax rates that have been enacted at the end of reporting period.

Deferred tax is provided for, using the liability method, on temporary differences at the reporting date between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unabsorbed tax losses and unutilised capital allowances can be utilised.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the end of reporting period. Deferred tax is recognised in the profit or loss, except when it arises from a transaction which is recognised directly in equity, in which case the deferred tax is also charged or credited directly in equity.

4.16 Currency conversion

Transactions in foreign currencies during the year are converted into Ringgit Malaysia at rates of exchange approximating those ruling at the transaction dates.

4.17 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

(a) Critical judgements in applying the accounting policies

In the process of applying the accounting policies, which are described in the above, management is of the opinion that there are no instances of application of judgment which are expected to have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

(b) Key sources of estimation uncertainty

Management believes that there are no key assumptions made concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

(b) Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Group and the Chamber is exposed to the financial risks arising from their operations and the use of financial instruments. The key financial risks include credit risk, liquidity risk and market risk. The Group and the Chamber reviews and agrees on policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarised below.

The Group's and the Chamber's operates within clearly defined guidelines and the Group and the Chamber policy is not to engage in speculative transactions.

(i) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss that may arise on outstanding financial instruments should a counterparty default on its obligations. The Group and the Chamber are exposure to credit risk primarily from investment securities, receivables which are financial assets, deposits, cash and bank balances.

The Group's and the Chamber's objective is to seek continual growth while minimising losses incurred due to increased credit risk exposure. Receivable balances are monitored on an on going basis with the result that the Group's and the Chamber's exposure to bad debts is not significant.

Impaired receivables

Individual receivables which are known to be uncollectable are written off by reducing the carrying amount directly. The other receivables are assessed at initial recognition to determine whether there is objective evidence that an impairment may exist. For these receivables the expected credit losses are recognised in a separate provision for impairment. The Group and the Chamber considers that there may be evidence of impairment if any of the following indicators are present:

- Significant financial difficulties of the debtor;
- Probability that the debtor will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation; and
- Historical default or delinquency in payments (more than 90 days overdue).

Receivables for which an impairment provision was recognised are written off against the provision when there is no expectation of recovering additional cash.

Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income within other operating expenses. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other operating expenses.

At December 31, 2025 there were no material receivables past due that have been deemed to be irrecoverable which have not been impaired or material individual balances which have been specifically impaired.

(ii) Market risks

The Chamber's activities expose it primarily to the financial risks of changes in equity price. The Chamber seeks to identify areas of significant risks as well as appropriate measures to control and mitigate these risks.

Equity price risks

The Group and the Chamber is exposed to equity price risk arising from its quoted investments held by the Group and the Chamber which are classified on the statements of financial position in other investments as financial assets at FVTOCI. Financial assets at FVTOCI are held for strategic rather than trading purposes. Further details of these investments are disclosed in Note 8 to the financial statements. To manage its price risk arising from investments in equity securities, the Group and the Chamber diversifies its portfolio.

(iii) Liquidity and cash flow risk

The Group's and the Chamber's exposure to liquidity and cash flow risks arises mainly from general funding and activities.

The Group and the Chamber practises prudent liquidity risk management by maintaining sufficient cash and bank balances to meet its working capital requirements.
